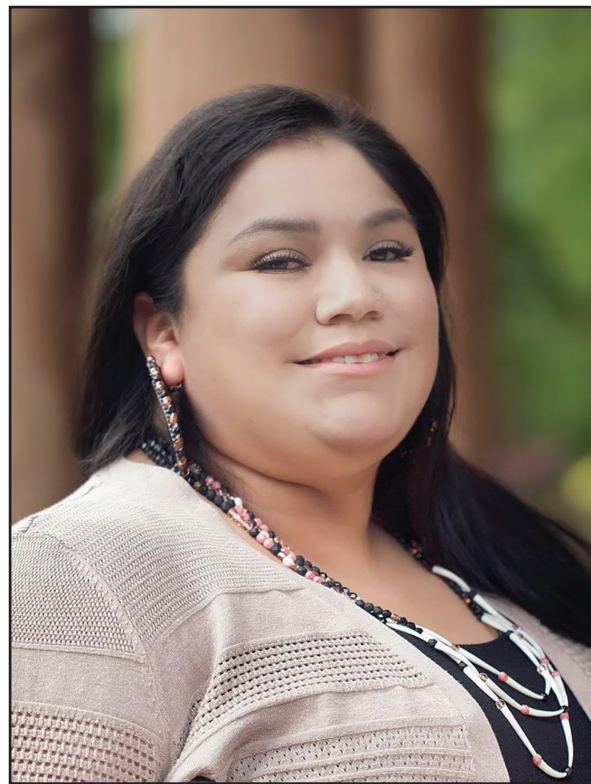

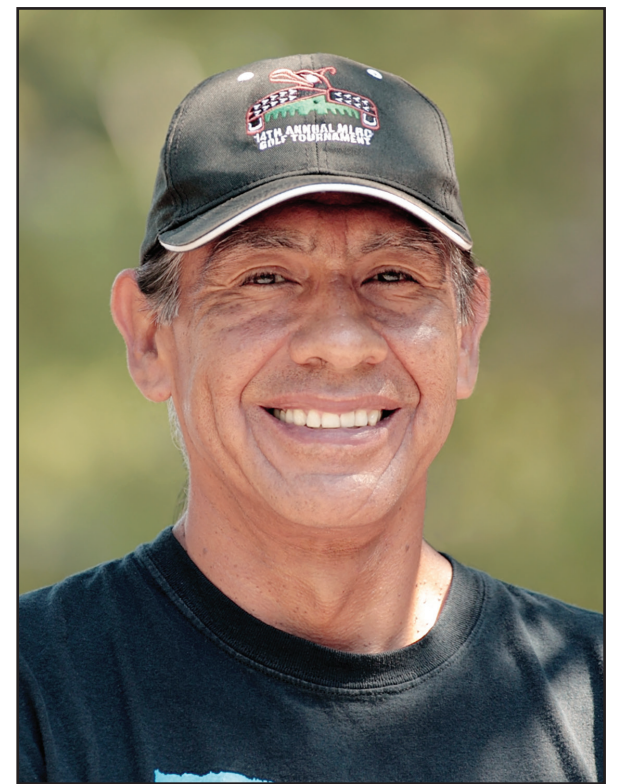

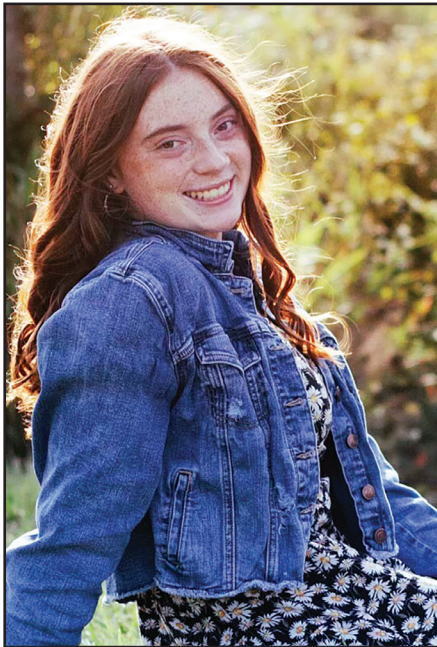
I look forward to helping solve issues so we, as a Tribe, can continue to move forward in a positive and Squaxin way.

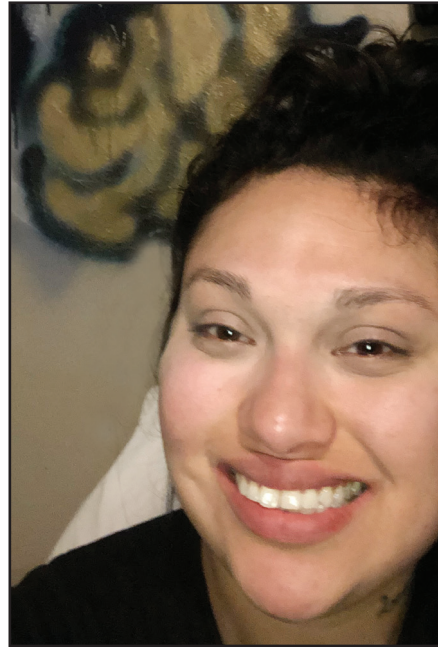

He has received scholarships from OSEA Chapter 15 and Oregon Promise.

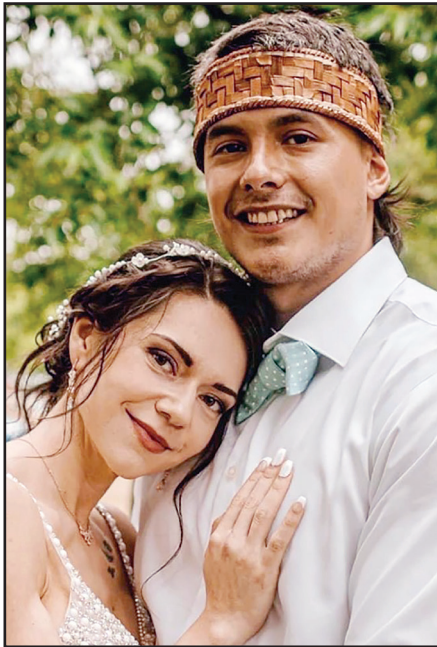
He plans to attend Rogue Community College for his main courses and dual enroll at Southern Oregon University to perform in Band at a college level.

During high school she participated in Track and Field and Cross Country. She also enjoys drawing, running and yoga.

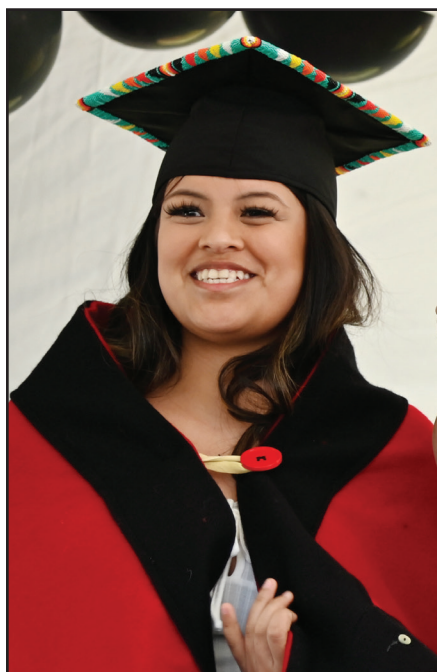
Naomi is currently employed at South Puget Intertribal Planning Agency (SPIPA).

She is currently employed as a Cashier at KTP Express and enjoys music, beading, and art.

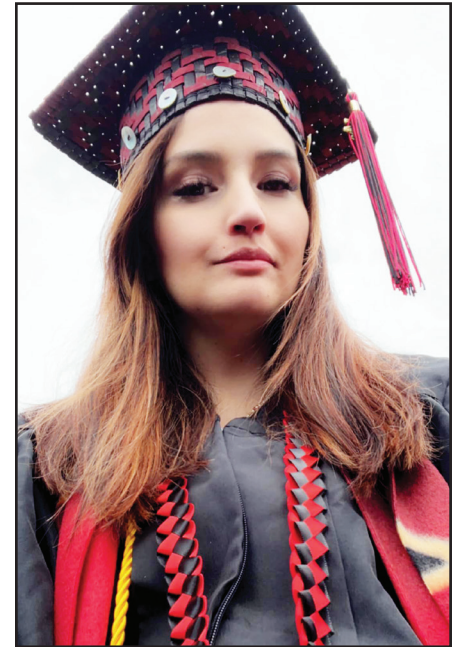

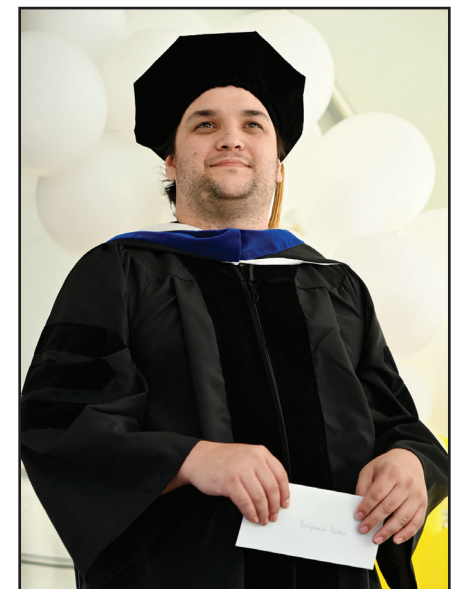

ER. GOD BLESS YOU. Know that you deserve to be celebrated and you are worth far more than words or things could ever say. I love you forever!

Also, it shouldn't have to be said, because it should be common sense, but please respect my brother. He has a huge heart. He's amazing. He's respectful. He is pure.

I would appreciate it if you respect my brother and see him through my eyes. He deserves to be celebrated. I want him to know that he is needed.

I just pray and ask that everyone show their family that they appreciate them so no one feels like they're not needed. You never know what a day may bring.

Know this, "that the Lord set apart his faithful servant for himself. The Lord hears when I call to him." Psalms 4:3.

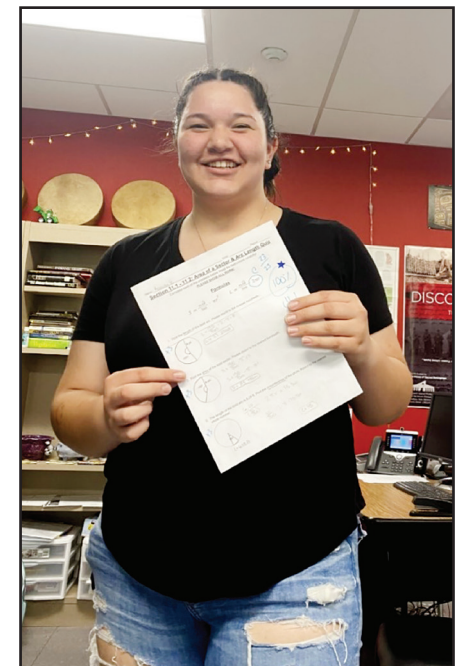
Olympic Middle School

We are accepting applications from Squaxin Island Tribal homeowners (who live on- or off-reservation) who meet the following criteria:

1. You own the home and it is your primary residence.
2. You have experienced financial hardship due to Covid-19 (after January 21, 2020) from one of the following:
 - Mortgage delinquencies
 - Foreclosure
 - Unpaid property tax
 - Past due utilities
 - Critical home repairs that would cause displacement
3. Your income falls at or below the following guidelines:

1 person	\$55,930
2 persons	\$63,920
3 persons	\$71,910
4 persons	\$79,900
5 persons	\$86,292
6 persons	\$92,684
7 persons	\$99,076
8 persons	\$105,468

If you answer yes to all three questions, you may qualify for assistance through the HAF Program.

Carly's Corner:

Use a Waterpik to Up Your Dental Game

Submitted by Carly Goltiani, Registered Dental Hygienist, Squaxin Island Dental Clinic - Chances are that if you have had your teeth cleaned by the hygienist here at Squaxin Island Dental Clinic (yours truly), it has probably been recommended to you to use a Waterpik as part of your daily dental home care routine.

A Waterpik, also known as a water flosser, is an effective dental tool to help clean between and around your teeth. It is also extremely helpful for cleaning out the food particles, bacteria and plaque from under your gumline and around braces, implants and bridges. For those who have mobility issues and find flossing difficult, a Waterpik can be a reasonable alternative for getting in those hard-to-reach areas.

Tips for Using a Waterpik:

- Make sure the Waterpik is fully charged and the reservoir is filled with warm water.
- There will most likely be multiple tips to use. The standard tip will be a good start. However, there are specialized tips for using around braces and implants as well. Be sure to use those instead if necessary.

- Use the lowest water pressure setting.
- Aim the jet of water along the gumline and in between the teeth at about a 90 degree angle. Start with the top teeth, moving slowly from the back of your mouth to the front and then do the same on the bottom teeth.
- Learning to use the Waterpik can be a bit messy. Make sure to lean over the sink and close your mouth while using it. This will allow the water to leak out of your mouth while avoiding excess splattering.
- Be sure to replace your Waterpik tips regularly (every 3-6 months) and clean the water reservoir regularly (weekly) as well.

The Waterpik should not replace brushing or flossing, unless absolutely necessary, but will help keep your mouth much cleaner and healthier when you add it to your daily routine.

Be sure to see your dentist and hygienist for regular check-ups and cleanings as well. Call to schedule your appointment at Squaxin Island Dental Clinic at (360) 432-3881.
