WHEREAS, the Squaxin Island Tribal Council is the governing body of the Squaxin Island tribe of Indians by the authority of the constitution and by-laws of the Squaxin Island Tribe, as approved and adopted by the General Body and the secretary of the Interior on July 8, 1965; and

WHEREAS, the Tribal Council has adopted the Squaxin Island fishing Ordinance, Resolution No. 81-55 and

WHEREAS, the Tribal Council finds it necessary and appropriate to amend the Fishing Ordinance for the purpose of managing and protecting the Tribal resource.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Squaxin Island Tribal Council does hereby amend the Squaxin Island Fishing Ordinance as set forth in the attachment.

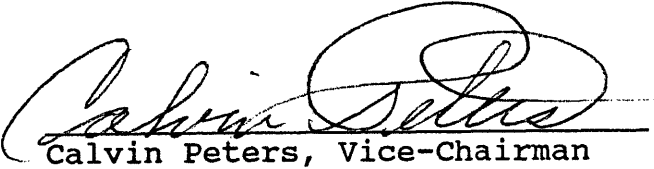

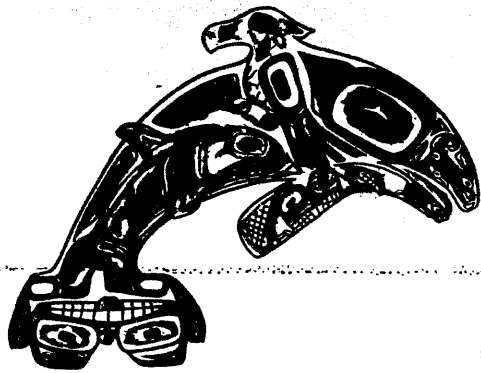

RESOLUTION

SQUAXIN ISLAND TRIBE

Squaxin Island Tribal Amendment 94-000

Amends the Squaxin Island Fishing Code and Annual fishing Regulations to;

Include incidental and interfering killing of Gray harbor seals and California Sea Lions

Year: 1995

Resolution #

Date Adopted:

Species: Gray Harbor Seals/California Sea Lions

Fishing year: 1995 thru 1996

Area: Medicine Creek Treaty Usual and Accustomed Areas

Potential Harvest: All licensed Squaxin Island fishers may legally, lethally harvest gray harbor seals and California sea lions interfering with said fishers and his/her fishing gear.

Restrictions: Due to safety precautions firearm use is restricted to a shotgun loaded with #2 buckshot or a lesser shot size.

NOTE: All harvest of the above mentioned mammals must be reported to the Squaxin Island Natural Resources office within 48 hours and reported as either incidental or interfering kills.
