RESOLUTION NO. 97- 13

SQUAXIN ISLAND TRIBAL COUNCIL

WHEREAS, the **Squaxin Island Tribal Council** is the Governing Body of the Squaxin Island Tribe by the authority of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Squaxin Island Tribe, as approved and adopted by the General Body and the Secretary of the Interior on July 8, 1965; and

WHEREAS, under the Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, the **Squaxin Island Tribal Council** is charged with the duty of protecting the health, security, and general welfare of the Squaxin Island Tribal Reservation residents; and,

WHEREAS, the Tribe is advised, by **South Puget Sound Intertribal Planning Agency (SPIPA)**, of the availability of funding through the Department of Health and Human Services, Public Health Service, Indian Health Service; Indian Child Protection and Child Abuse Prevention Grants for American Indians and Alaska Natives, Fiscal Year 1997.


THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the **Squaxin Island Tribal Council** does hereby authorize the **SPIPA** Executive Director to submit a proposal and any amendment thereto, for funding of Indian Child Protection and Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment.


BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the **Squaxin Island Tribal Council** does hereby authorize the Tribal Chairman or the Executive Director to be the Tribe's signatory and representative in all future matters requiring Tribal authorization on this particular project; and


BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that these authorities shall be for the duration of this project.

South Puget Intertribal Planning Agency  
Indian Child Protection and Child Abuse Prevention Initiative  
Abstract

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The South Puget Intertribal Planning Agency is proposing a 5 year Indian Child Protection and Child Abuse Prevention Initiative to increase the level of therapy services being provided to the 5 tribal communities through SPIPA, together with increased funding support for community based and intertribal child abuse prevention activities. The project will have three components or objectives:

**Objective 1: Prevention Activities and Tribal CPT Training:**

In conjunction with Tribal Child Protective Teams, to carry out tribal specific child abuse and neglect prevention activities, trainings, and teachings, that will strengthen families, increase support available to children at risk for abuse and violence, and support training and capacity building activities for tribal child protective teams.

**Objective 2: Therapy Services :**

To provide increased support to the SPIPA Therapy program in order to broaden the types and levels of therapy services that can be provided to children within the 5 communities, over and above the current sexual assault therapy services currently available.

**Objective 3: Promoting Community Protective Factors Through Traditional Gatherings:**

To provide support to annual family conferences/gatherings that focus on developing the protective cultural factors that will reduce the incidence of child abuse and neglect through the recognition and fostering of protective cultural factors that strengthen the family unit and honor and affirm traditional roles.

The project recognizes that there have been system improvements to tribal CPT's over the past several years, and that these improvements need to be built upon through additional funding support directed to each tribal community for child abuse prevention services and activities through the CPT teams.

The project also recognizes the critical need for additional therapy services is critical to SPIPA and the Tribe. Funding for therapy is derived from one SPIPA grant through the state of Washington, and the addition of a one quarter to one half time half time therapist position would enable SPIPA to provide on site therapy at tribal locations for not only sexual assault, but also family violence issues, child abuse and neglect, and mental health issues.

The intergenerational component will provide funds to help support the intertribal gathering for men, women, children and families that stress cultural values and traditions as a community protective factor that strengthen families and parents, and protects children..

Tribes would receive a passthrough amount of approximately \$17,000 each. This could be used to fund CPT team training, conducting parenting classes, sponsor cultural/self esteem activities for children, and sponsor community events that include a cultural values/mental health approach to promoting stable families and protecting children.

IHS will award 6-7 grants nationwide. Tribal resolutions are required for the project. The grant must be mailed May 29, 1997.

## Indian Child Protection and Child Abuse Prevention Grant, FY 1997

**BUDGET NARRATIVE**Component 1 - Community-Based Prevention, Education and Outreach

SPIPA requests funding to contract for continuing education training for the SPIPA Board members, Social Services Manager and contracted therapist staff. Total (Contractual) Training Request = \$5,000.

The consortium Tribes request funding @ \$5,000/Tribe to support Child Protection Team (CPT) activities within each tribe. Total (Other) CPT/Prevention Request = \$25,000.

The consortium Tribes request funding @ \$4,600/Tribe to support Native Parenting Education activities within each tribe. Total (Contractual) Native Parenting Education Request = \$23,000.

The consortium Tribes request funding @ \$2,000/Tribe for the development and dissemination of Community Outreach materials. Total (Supplies) Community Outreach Request = \$10,000.

Component 2 - Child Abuse Treatment/Therapy

SPIPA will contract with a therapist for 3 FTE to provide individual and family therapy services. Therapy services will be provided at the SPIPA offices, on-site at each of the reservations, and in-home at the discretion of the therapist and as requested by the participating tribes. (Contractual)Therapist Request = \$23,088

Therapist travel reimbursement is requested @ 500 miles/month x 12 months x 31 cents/mile. Total Travel Request = \$1,860

Supplies are requested for therapy supplies including art and play therapy supplies and materials @ \$250 x six therapy sites (SPIPA and five Tribes). Total Supplies Request = \$1,500

Component 3 - Community-Based Intergenerational Cultural Activities

SPIPA requests \$10,000 to purchase materials, supplies and secure facilities necessary to produce an Intertribal Cultural Activity. Total (Other) Intertribal Cultural Activities Request = \$10,000.

The consortium Tribes request funding @ \$5,000/Tribe to purchase materials, supplies and enter into agreements necessary to produce Intergenerational Cultural Activities within each Tribe. Total (Other) Community Cultural Activities Request = \$25,000.

Evaluation Component

SPIPA will contract with an outside evaluator to perform a formal, written evaluation of the project. Total (Contractual) Evaluation Request = \$7,500.

Indirect Charges

SPIPA's negotiated indirect cost rate (attached) is 20% and provides for supervisory, administrative, fiscal and grant management services. The portion of the grant request directed to tribal activities will be passed through at a rate of 10% as follows:

\$47,698 (SPIPA direct charges) x .20 = \$9,540

\$84,250 (tribal pass through direct) x .10 = \$8,425

Total Indirect Charges Request = \$17,965

Total Direct and Indirect Charges requests for funding of the Intertribal Child Protection and Child Abuse Prevention Request = \$149,913.
