RESOLUTION NO. 98-__0 & of the SOUAXIN ISLAND TRIBAL COUNCIL

WHEREAS, the Squaxin Island Tribal Council is the Governing Body of the Squaxin Island Tribe by the authority of the Constitution and Bylaws of the Squaxin Island Tribe, as approved and adopted by the General Body and the Secretary of the Interior on July 8, 1965; and,

WHEREAS, under the Constitution and Bylaws of the Tribe, the Squaxin Island Tribal Council is charged with the duty of protecting the health, security, and general welfare of the Squaxin Island Tribal Reservation residents; and,

WHEREAS, the Bureau of Indian Affairs has announced the availability of funds for watershed restoration projects on Tribal lands to include reservation lands, ceded lands, reserve treaty areas, or historical use areas; and that are within the range of the Northern Spotted Owl under the President's Forest Plan (FEMAT); and,

WHEREAS, the Natural Resources Department of the Squaxin Island Tribe has cooperated for more than eleven years with the Simpson Timber Company and the Washington State Department of Fish and Wildlife to secure restoration of the Goldsborough Creek watershed through the removal of the Goldsborough Creek dam; and,

WHEREAS, the Goldsborough Creek dam is recognized by all parties as a major impediment and barrier to anadromous fish migration from river mile two through the remaining 16 miles of Goldsborough Creek and its tributaries; and,

WHEREAS, the members of the Squaxin Island Tribe are linked historically, culturally, and economically to production of anadromous fish stocks from all of the watersheds of the southern Puget Sound.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Squaxin Island Tribal Council does hereby approve submission of a grant application to the Bureau of Indian Affairs in support of, and as a financial contribution to, the proposed project to remove the Goldsborough Creek dam and to restore the stream channel in the impacted vicinity of the dam; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Squaxin Island Tribal Council does hereby authorize the Tribal Chairman, the Executive Director, or the Deputy Executive Director to be the Tribe's signatory and representative in all future matters requiring Tribal authorization on this particular project; and,

BE IF FINALLY RESOLVED that these authorities shall be for the duration of this project.




A Project to Demolish the Goldsborough Dam and Restore Natural River Process
